BETTER.

The careful reader of the Epistle to the Hebrews will have noticed there the frequent recurrence of that word "better." It is the keynote of the Epistle. The writer has been contrasting the old covenant God made with His people and the new covenant made through "better." It is a noble word, and strikes for us a note full of promise and progress. It says to us "The past is good, the present better, and the future best of all." This note is both Christian and true. The moment contentment with one's attainment comes, decay begins, and the end is not far off. Of an Italian artist of great merit it was said: "He satisfied himself with none of his works." Of the great Danish Sculptor it is told that he bowed in despair before his great statue of Christ and said, "I have satisfied myself, and can make no further progress."

It is an excellent word to carry with us in our chosen vocation. The merchant and the mechanic alike, realize the need of the upward course. The physician, the lawyer, and the preacher alike appreciate the value of a mind alert to the passing opportunity and the coming discovery. The ranks of the mediocre are always full. But welcoming hands are ever extended to those who are ready for the call of the hour, and eager for success at whatever cost.

It is a sound motto for Christian experience. "Grow in grace," is Apostolic counsel. Count the experience of yesterday as only preliminary to the larger experience of to-day and to-morrow. Count the blessing of yesterday as the rain-drops from the throne of grace, a sure prophecy and

rich promise of the greater measure to be had for the asking to-day. It is the purpose of that God, who forgave us yesterday, and raised us up to-day, that to-morrow we shall sit in heavenly places with Christ, and enjoy to the full the exceeding riches of His grace. How full of blessing life could be the hearty were hungry for the things that minister to life!

As with the heart, so with the mind. In our pursuit of the Divine, knowledge must keep pace with grace. The mind enlarges in response to truth, as surely as the heart in the possession of grace. And the Master wants to fill the mind as well as the heart. He renews the mind, and makes it a fit receptacle for truth. He insists that the Father be loved with the mind as well as with the heart. A love that is intelligent, as well as sincere and fervent. "Gird up the loins of your mind," is Peter's counsel. It is as necessary that the mind be alert and eager, as that the body be kept in truest form. There is a revealing request in one of Paul's Epistles, written from prison. He makes request of Timothy that he bring his books, especially the parchments. He was eager to keep the mind alert, and wanted his books for intellectual exercise. His parchments were his Bible. That must have the first place.

And that word "better" should be written large on Christian service. Whatever may be the character of our work for Christ, there is always room for improvement in the quality of it. There is no proof needed that God is worthy our best; and in seeking to give our best we find our path into that which is better. "To him that

hath, shall be given," is Heaven's decree. He who consecrates the little he has to God, will find the little becoming much, and the much more. And our pursuit of the better will bring us at last to the best at that feast where the King shall gird Himself, and wait upon His own servants, and Heaven's best will be their portion and life's highest aspirations be satisfied. He, who seeks the better aims higher than he knows, and in the thrill of attainment finds that the half was never told him.

The following from the "Examiner" is timely and pertinent:

A MAN PLUS.

Christ's desire for mankind was that it might be improved. He had a higher aim for man than simply to secure him for heaven. His teachings and his endeavors all had one end to accomplish, and that was to produce a choicer brand of man. He sought to fit man for a heaven to be, but He also labored that man might be better fitted for the earth that now is. He would ultimately present humanity unto Himself, "without spot or wrinkle, or any such thing," but He would also remove some of the spots that disfigure and defile humanity here and now.

Human nature must therefore be more than human, or religion is a failure. The divine must appear in the undivine. Christianity is more than a moral disinfectant. It is a tonic. It destroys disease germs, but it also invigorates what disease has already impaired. It is more than a rubbish remover; it is a builder. It is a seed sower as well as a weed destroyer—a fertilizer of good seed as well as the destruction of the bad. One of the cardinal principles taught by Jesus Christ was enunciated by the prophet before him: "Cease to do evil; learn to do well." (Isa. 1:17.) Be not a bane, but be a blessing; be not a hinderer, but a helper.

Christianity aims to produce not

simply a man, but a *man plus*. For that it stands, and anything less than that is a reflection upon its efficiency. It would take a real human being, with all his appetites, propensities and inclinations, and add something to him, still leaving him a real human being *plus* Jesus Christ, rather than transforming him into a kind of ethereal or angelic existence. What Jesus would exhibit to the world is a piece of common flesh and blood with improvements after the pattern of Himself, a common man with an uncommon sense, a man living among men and yet being more than the average man, sojourning in the world and yet adding something to it. This is what He meant when He said: "What do ye more than others?" and "It shall not be so among you." After Nehemiah, the model mayor of Jerusalem, had told of the practices of his predecessors in office, he added: "But so did not I, because of the fear of the Lord." Thus he became an officeholder *plus*. When the Hebrew captives refused to live as other men about them lived they showed that their religion made them *young men plus*. When we allow the spirit of Jesus Christ to possess us, directing our careers and shaping our conduct, we, too, will be known as men and women *plus*, and that is his aim with us.
