Headed to Africa!

Tomorrow, Lord willing, I board an airplane on my way to the West African country of Ghana. Now why would I be headed to Africa? It's a long story...

At the beginning of this year, I received an e-mail from Joseph Sun, the director of academic programs at Penn's Engineering School. I had met him while I was in school, and worked with him and a few other students to start the Penn Engineering Christian Society. It was through Joe that I was privileged to go to China in the summer of 2001, to set up a computer lab for a new Christian university that was opening just outside of Beijing, the capital of China.

Anyway, Joe invited me to lunch. The old saying that there's no such thing as a free lunch holds true, for I was hooked (willingly, I might add) into a mission trip to Ghana, with a team from Narberth Presbyterian Church and the Church of the Good Samaritan. Along the way, my father joined the team, and while he isn't able to join us in Ghana, he's worked with us all the way in getting ready for the trip.

The primary purpose of our trip is to support the local church in Ghana by setting up 80 computers at the Christian Service College in Kumasi, Ghana. As an integral part of our trip, we will be working to train the staff and some of the students on the computers, in basic tasks such as word processing, but also on the use of digital reference software for scripture study and research.

The Christian Service College (CSC) is a training school for pastors and ministry leaders in Ghana, and is quickly expanding to meet the need for quality Christian education. In West Africa, Ghana is a missionary-sending country, greatly increasing the impact of a school like the CSC.

One of the exciting aspects of the trip is that in partnership with the churches in Kumasi, we will be able to open the computer lab to recently graduated high school students, who will join us for two



days of Bible study, worship, and computer training. The theme of the camp is the "Fruit of the Spirit." It may sound like an odd mix of activities, but this serves to build up the body of Christ, allowing our team to fellowship with the Ghanaians, while teaching some of the skills with which the Lord has blessed us.

During the computer setup, I will focus primarily on the technical aspects of setting up the computers, and troubleshooting when things don't work right (with 80 PCs, this is bound to happen!). For the camp, I have double duty, teaching two of the Bible study sessions Monday and Tuesday morning, one on Peace and Patience, and the other on Kindness, Goodness, and Faithfulness. In the afternoons, I will lead training sessions for the staff of the college.

A lot of work has already taken place to prepare for this trip. A team member's employer was gracious enough to donate all the computers, and to prepare them for shipment to Ghana. The computers were boxed and put on pallets and shipped May 1, and left from Norfolk, Virginia by "slow boat to Africa"... it took more than two months for them to get across the ocean!

Our team has been hard at work praying and getting ready for the trip, learning about Ghana and the Ghanaian culture, as well as preparing the materials for the Bible studies and for the computer training. This is where my father has had a significant part on the team, putting together all the computer books that we will use.



Please pray for this mission trip to Ghana. Specifically, pray for our physical safety, particularly for safe travel. Pray for the unity of our team, that even when things get hectic or don't go as planned, that we would demonstrate by our actions the fruit of the Spirit that we hope to convey by our words. Pray that He would enable us to setup the computers quickly and smoothly, and that this cooperation between the American and the Ghanaian church would bear fruit for the Kingdom of God.

Profiles of Our 2003 Graduates



Dr. Manuelita Buenaflor

On February 28, 2003, Dr. Buenaflor graduated from Union Institute and University, in Cincinnati, Ohio, with a Doctor of Philosophy degree in Child and Family Counseling.

We know the new Dr. Buenaflor (PhD) better as "Q P." Q P is a member of both our Church (since 1988) and Sunday School, where she is currently a worker in the children's Sunday Bible School. She also serves "Wyoming" as a member of the Diaconate, the Board of Christian Education, the Music Committee, and the Choir.

She received the Lord as her own personal Savior, and was baptized when she was 13 years old. Her life then, as now, was deeply involved in her church. She began teaching Sunday School at about 15, and continued until she attended college.

Prior to her emigration to the United States, Q P lived in the city of Mindanao, in the Philippine Islands. She grew up in a home where both her mother and father were Christians. Her mother is still living in the Philippines. She also has three sisters, Nancy, Eden, and Nehemiah, and two brothers, Nathaniel, and Joseph



She completed her undergraduate studies at Doane Baptist College in the Philippines, and earned her Masters of Religious Education degree at Grand Rapids Baptist Seminary in Michigan, where she lived when first arriving in the U.S. in 1985.

Even though Q P did much of her recent work for her doctorate at home, she flew frequently either to the Cincinnati campus, or to Washington, DC, to meet with her doctoral advisors. In the process, she accumulated about 60,000 air miles.

She says her doctoral dissertation, entitled "Can Spiritual Beliefs Change Behavior," was somewhat controversial with her doctoral committee of five professors. It seems all of them are humanistic in their

spiritual understanding, and could not comprehend why Q P laid such heavy emphasis on Christianity in proving her theme. They attempted to convince her to change her subject, or at least to tone down the prominence of the Christian faith in her writing. She refused, stating that if she did, she would have nothing to write about.

Q P is currently employed at the Multi-Ethnic Behavioral House here in Philadelphia.

Rev. Daniel Ndimantang

In May of 2003, with the enabling of the Holy Spirit, and after much prayer and study, the Rev. Ndimantang received his masters degree in Biblical Counseling from Biblical Theological Seminary, in Hatfield, PA. While the studying was his own, the feat was not accomplished without the dedicated support of his loving wife, Rose.

Before we speak further of Daniel's educational and career achievements, we relate a bit of their family information. Daniel's father and mother, Moses and Hannah, had six children. There are five surviving. Rose has eight siblings.

Daniel and Rose, who were married in 1973, also had six children, of which five survive. Starting from the eldest, they are Silas, Naomi, Hosea, Victor, and, the youngest, Bernice. Naomi, is studying at Eastern University, in the Philadelphia suburb of St. Davids, and Bernice is

attending the Christopher Doc Christian High School in Lansdale. The rest remain back in Cameroon under the guardianship of relatives.

Daniel met the Lord in 1956, and was baptized in 1957, in the Chotmakulang River. He started his lay ministry in his local church in June of 1963.

Before his latest degree, Daniel had received his education both in Cameroon and in the U. S. In Cameroon, after graduating from high School, he received training in two areas, from 1964 to 1992. The first was in teacher's education at the Kom Baptist College. That launched his teaching career, which lasted for 19 years, at several Christian elementary and high schools.

During this period, Daniel continued his education in the second area of learning, and earned his Batchelor of Theology degree in Pastoral Ministry from the Cameroon Baptist Theological Seminary.

On May 28th, 1992, while already having served as Chaplain for Saher Baptist College in Limbe, and the Baptist High School in Buea, Daniel was ordained to the gospel ministry. Shortly after that, he was called to serve as the first Pastor of the newly-formed Faith Baptist Church in the capital city of Yaounde, a position he held from 1993 to 1998, when he was authorized, by the Cameroon Baptist Convention, to come to the U.S. for post-graduate studies.

He and Rose became members of "Wyoming" in 2000. He now serves on the Board of trustees, and she on the Board of Missions.

On first coming to the U. S., you may remember, Daniel studied at Westminster Theological Seminary in Glenside for a few years, and earned his Masters degree in Urban Missiology from that school in 2002.

His plans for the future include serving as the Assistant to the Pastor here at "Wyoming," a position to which the Deacons called him, while seeking to raise funds from various sources for the establishment of a Christian high school in Cameroon, in 2004.

The school would provide a unique seven-year post-elementary curriculum, with the goal of training students not only in academics, but also in a useful vocation. The uniqueness of the schooling lies in the fact that it would be specifically designed to help the students use that vocation as a springboard to witness to the gospel of Jesus Christ. To accomplish that, their training would include practical evangelistic field experiences.

The entire Christian family of "Wyoming" salutes you and congratulates you on your latest success. We pray for your continued advancement in the Lord's work.
