STRIVING FOR SINLESSNESS AND TRUE LOVE

How great is the love the Father has lavished on us, that we should be called children of God! And that is what we are! The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. Dear friends, now we are children of God, and what we will be has not yet been made known. But we know that when he appears, we shall be like him, for we shall see him as he is. Everyone who has this hope in him purifies himself, just as he is pure.

Everyone who sins breaks the law; in fact, sin is lawlessness. But you know that he appeared so that he might take away our sins. And in him is no sin. No one who lives in him keeps on sinning. No one who continues to sin has either seen him or known him...

This is how we know what love is: Jesus Christ laid down his life for us. And we ought to lay down our lives for our brothers. If anyone has material possessions and sees his brother in need but has no pity on him, how can the love of God be in him? Dear children, let us not love with words or tongue but with actions and in truth. This then is how we know that we belong to the truth, and how we set our hearts at rest in his presence whenever our hearts condemn us. For God is greater than our hearts, and he knows everything.

Dear friends, if our hearts do not condemn us, we have confidence before God and receive from him anything we ask, because we obey his commands and do what pleases him. And this is his command: to believe in the name of his Son, Jesus Christ, and to love one another as he commanded us. (1 John 3:1-6; 16-23)

This chapter is an eye-opening chapter to the fact of what uncompromised love looks like. If we follow through with what we read here, this is life changing. Living in fellowship with God and with each other as children in the same divine family is a calling for each of us. It is wonderful to see

the purifying influence of the blessed hope we see in verses 2 and 3 of this chapter. As we love God, he will help us strive for sinlessness, as we see in verses 6 and 9. Of course, many of us are troubled by this, saying, "How can we live sinless in this world?" Again, I say, only through the person of Christ and the power of the Holy Spirit will this be possible. John knows that many of the children of God that

love him and each other battle with sin each day (1 Corinthians 10:13) – and we are reminded that we have an advocate when we do sin (1 John 2:1-3). But in this chapter, John is referring to those who don't love God and seem not to be bothered with habitual practices of sin. That's the person the apostle is describing.

He makes it clear that if we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us (1 John 1:8). We are called to love other believers, whether or not they love us in return. This is one evidence of the assurance of salvation (v. 14). The indwelling Spirit is also there to assure us (v. 24). What a chapter this is for a loveless world like ours. What bitter feud and estrangement characterizes so many Christians today who fail to love God and each other. But praise be to our wonderful heavenly father – we are beginning to see, feel, and experience some new Holy Spirit wind that is fanning the flames of love in our midst. So let not the world, the flesh, or the devil quench this new wind. Let us show our continuing love toward God by spending time with him in prayer and with him in his word, meditating on his person. Also, let us love each other by spending time in the word and in prayer, and in worship together, in serving each other and those in our community. May the glory and the honor and praise of his name be magnified among all the peoples with whom we interact. Never forget, we can only go so far as we go together in and through the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

MINISTRY UPDATES

The Second Mile Men's Bible Study continues to be an incredible blessing and challenge to each of the men who participate. We have anywhere from 15 to 20 men who participate each week. One of the most exciting and blessing experiences we have witnessed is not only seeing people come to faith, but also to see the growth and development of our own men who have stepped up to the plate. These men are showing their gifts and their desire and passion for the Word of God. This has been deeply encouraging. We had a men's retreat last January that was very blessing and encouraging. We have had men step up and work around the church and for those in need. We have seen godly men rising up and growing the knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

Our "Prospective Leaders" training occurs every other week. We share dinner and fellowship, and spend about 2 hours discussing what it takes to be a leader in the church, in the service of our Lord.

The Family Fall Festival was an incredible blessing, particularly to see such a large representation from our own church in preparing and ministering to our community. Many in our community experienced great blessing – and they are still, to this day, speaking of that day. If you'd like to see some photographs from that day, visit our church website.

We started taking Fridays to go out and visit newcomers and those who desire a visit from our church. We found the experience blessing and encouraging, and have seen families recommit to fellowship, and also come to know Jesus Christ. We are learning to love our community with God's *agape* love. Also on Fridays, before we visit, we have gathered on Fridays for personal and corporate prayer.

We hosted a training session run by American Association of Christian Counselors in October, teaching how to respond to grief and trauma. Three of our women were able to participate in these courses free of charge, and are better prepared to minister in the congregation in times of great need.

We also hosted a youth worker training conference called "RELOAD" – I participated by presenting a session on violence and gangs with one of the detectives from the Police Department who is an expert on gangs in the inner city.

In partnership with other churches, we had an International Worship Night, led by a worship team from an Indonesian church. It may have been different for each of those who attended, but different is good – when it is for the glory of God.

On Thanksgiving, we continued our annual dinner with lots of help from Tony and Lily and many others. The response to the food baskets was not as extensive as we would have expected, but there was plenty of food available for all who requested it.

Home Builders has been designed with the purpose of strengthening our families within the church – both single parents and couples who desire to strengthen their family ties. Sandy and Bill Burton and Joey and Jeanne Muñoz are currently leading this class, and may be gaining additional help from a couple who are visiting with us for a season. Also from Church of the Saviour, Frank Carioli has come alongside to help with the youth Sunday School class. We are also glad to have Lois, his wife, with us from time to time. I believe this is a direct answer to our prayer to raise up people both within and outside the church to minister with us.

Upcoming events to pray about:

- Our church picnic
- Vacation Bible School
- Continued partnership with the Whosoever Gospel Mission, and the afterschool program, and possible partnering for drug and alcohol counseling
- Children's Safe Harbor possible partnerships, sharing life in the culture of death among children
- Men's retreat in June, and a women's retreat in May.
- National Police Week
- Mother's and Father's Day, and even Children's Day

Other areas of ministry to continue to pray about:

- Work with the police, doing roll calls, serving as a chaplain
- Chaplaincy at the Cancer Treatment Center of America, and the patients and their families, for whom I've done some funerals
- Continued relationship building with the Muslims in our community, and with other ministers who focus on Muslim outreach.

Report of the Sunday School Superintendent



"Wyoming" is becoming the "place to be" for more Feltonville kids than ever! Here are some of the different ways God is drawing the young ones to Him:

SUNDAY MORNING

In 2007 we continued with the highly successful large group / small group format, using materials called "Living Inside Out." No programming was

offered at the 9:30 hour, and kids in grades K-5 were asked to worship with their families at the beginning of the church service until the time came for them to exit. Then we all met upstairs for our own singing and Bible point time, afterward breaking up into small groups of five or six kids, each in its own age group, and each with its own small group leader.

This method of staffing worked very well for the better part of the year. Then in the Spring, it started to become more difficult to obtain volunteers to head up the small groups. By year's end we were in a situation where we had to go back to splitting the kids into two groups, each with up to 10 or more kids, because on most Sundays the only staff members available were Debby and Becky Crockett, the director and assistant director. In addition, the publisher of the "Living Inside Out" curriculum had decided to not produce any more materials after the first year's worth. To stretch out the remaining materials, some month's programs were based on the essential portions of various 2007 VBS programs other than the one we used in our VBS. Some of this material, since it was being used in the Fall after most churches were finished with VBS, was donated to us by 2 churches we had contact with online.

So as 2007 came to a close, we were faced with finding new materials and with finding new ways to encourage members of the congregation to volunteer. But still, a big THANK YOU goes out to all of the small group volunteers who DID come forward to help throughout the year. As we move into 2008, everyone is encouraged to find out what Children's Ministry is all about, and to answer the call to be a part of this most important privilege in God's Kingdom.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL

The theme of this year's Vacation Bible School was "Avalanche Ranch," taking us to a cattle ranch high in the Rockies to learn about God. Our format was the same as last year, with no graded classes for older children. Small groups of about five children of mixed ages, or "crews," traveled from one activity to another over the course of the evening, led by their crew leader. These crew leaders were mostly youth visiting from a Chinese church near Baltimore, Maryland.

For this year's "hands-on" missions project, the children stuffed "Prayer Bears," brightly printed with the name of Jesus in English, French, and Spanish. The bulk of these were sent to a hospital in Cameroon along with scripture booklets in French, and a small number of the bears were given to Beky Poteat to take back with her to Togo. Thanks goes out to those who contributed in various ways to decorate, provide the unusual snacks, and present the Bible in exciting new ways. Special thanks goes to those who had their first time working in the ministry, due to the program's being offered in the evening for the first time in 30 years!

FALL FAMILY FESTIVAL

On October 31, we had our fourth "Fall Family Festival," giving the kids in our community a fun and safe alternative to knocking on doors for candy. For the first time, the event required blocking off Wyoming Avenue to make room for the huge inflated games and all of the booths. Young children were invited with their parents to come inside the building for a scaled-down version of the same fun going on outside for the older ones. Young and old were treated to an evening of fun, games, prizes, great music, fabulous food (much of which was donated by businesses in the area), and the preaching of the Gospel! Thanks to all who made it possible.

COOKIE DAY

In November, the Sunday Bible School sponsored the annual cookie day, producing hundreds of cookies for the Whosoever Gospel Mission After School Program, and the Philadelphia Park racetrack ministry. Thanks to those who came and made it a success.

CHRISTMAS CONCERTS

This year, our kids joined with kids from Church of the Saviour to put on the musical "The Mystery of the Manger." The program was performed at both COS and Wyoming. On the day of the performance at COS (in Wayne, PA), our kids spent the afternoon between rehearsal and performance having food and fun at Chuck E. Cheese's in Berwyn. An amazing time was had by all! A big thanks goes to Jen Rivera, Wanda Montanez, Frank from COS, and all the others who made it possible by giving their time to work and be with us.

THE CHALLENGE

This remains the same, year after year. Praise be to God that the children continue to be with us, not just for special events, but every week as we gather for Bible study, prayer, and worship. As always, we end the year with great opportunities ahead of us. Please consider how you, a member of the church of yesterday, might fit in to the many opportunities for service to the church of today, our kids. We ask for your continued support, through prayer, and in bringing out children, and joining us in the work.

Report of the Board of Deacons

THE SPIRIT AT WORK

The biggest theme of our work as a church in 2007 was this: **you stepped up to the plate**. God is moving among us to mature us, his people, in character, commitment, and service.

If you look at attendance, we are a smaller church than in 2005 and 2006. While our numbers have not increased, we have grown together as the body of Christ – in maturity, in wisdom, in ministry one to another. The men's and women's fellowships continue to be a "flash-point" for the work of the Spirit among us, bringing men and women into fellowship with the Lord, and into fellowship with his people. These times of family building have made us stronger and more focused on the gospel.



We had amazing volunteer involvement in Vacation Bible School, the Family Fall Festival, the church flag football team, and other events. In areas where we had relied on other churches for staffing, you stepped up to the plate, not only filling the gaps, but building a sense of "community" with one another and with our neighbors.

UNITY IN THE BODY AND WORSHIP

We reported last year that we felt it was necessary to have two separate worship services, one with a more traditional flavor, the other more contemporary. Well, it was an idea that fell flat on its face with you, the congregation. You valued unity above personal preference – people renewed their commitment to corporate worship, and that was that. (Shirley says, "us old goats are getting used to the way things are.") Praise God!

We have had a mix of live and recorded music in our services, including the worship videos for many newer songs, to try to incorporate a more contemporary sound. As the congregation grows (particularly in maturity), we are looking at engaging those of you with musical talent to improve the quality and variety of our worship. Mildred Arroyo has already started working with teenagers to form a youth choir, and those interested in worship will begin meeting on a regular basis this January.

PRE-SCHOOL: END OF A SEASON

Sadly, this past year saw the end of a long season in the life of church. One of our preschool teachers, Annie Rodriguez, died suddenly in May, just after school ended for the

summer. With the shrinking number of students, the difficulty of finding another qualified teacher, and the inability of the church to financially support the school, we decided not to open the Pre-School for the 2007-2008 school year. This is not just the end of a season for the church, it is an end of a season for long-time teachers Nancy Dambach and Shirley Parcell. Nancy worked for the school for over 30 years, and Shirley for 20 years. For the last few years, Nancy was also director of the pre-school.

We are already thinking of how we can re-make in ways that make it a more helpful ministry to our community and also self-supporting. Pray that God would provide guidance and wisdom and opportunity as we look forward in faith.

MINISTRY TEAM CHANGES

This past year also brought with it changes in our body and in the ministry team at the church. Coz and Joyce Crosscombe joined CityNet Ministries as missionaries, and are now working with a large group of churches. Coz in particular helps churches "network" with each other to share resources, skills, and knowledge. Their membership continues to be at Wyoming, but they are in the process of visiting churches to find a good base for their new ministry. We continue to support Coz and Joyce through our missionary budget.

Jen and Maher Salhani joined the American Missionary Fellowship, and continue to meet with and build up the Muslim Bridge Team. The outreach to Muslims in this area has radically changed over the past two years, and they are praying and seeking the Lord's guidance as to how he wants this work reformed. We continue to support Jen and Maher through our missionary budget.

Following Marion Burke's retirement as secretary in 2006, Jen Salhani stepped in to fill the position. With Jen Salhani's departure in March, Pastor Lou has been mostly without an assistant in the office. Thankfully, God brought Jen and Harold Rivera to the church in the fall, and Jen has been volunteering a couple days each week in the office. Many secretaries wait to answer phone calls – Jen will be calling you to get you involved.

In July, Pastor Marni resigned from his position at the church, and he and Linda are now at Cedar Grove Church. We pray that God would continue to work in their lives and bless their ministry together.

This coming year, Pastor Daniel will be transitioning into his role as director of Comprehensive Vocational Academies, Int'l, the group that was formed to implement the vision God has given to Pastor Daniel for a Christian vocational school in his home country of Cameroon. For the near future, we will be providing Pastor Daniel with a place to stay, free of charge, and with a significant level of annual missionary support. Please pray that God would raise up faithful and generous givers to complete what is needed in Pastor Daniel and Rose's personal support, as well as the funds needed to build and start the school in Cameroon.

GROWING LEADERS

For the first time in many years, we see the number of servants in the congregation growing instead of shrinking. From among these are rising a new harvest of leaders for this church. Pastor Lou is leading a "Prospective Leaders" class using Warren Wiersbe's book, *On Being a Servant of God*.

We praise God that he is preparing men and women to lead his people. While the church has changed and diversified amazingly over the last few years, the leadership has come mostly from the "old church." It is time that the leadership of the church fully reflects the people in the congregation – old and young, and of different cultures and ethnicities.

OUR ROLE AS DEACONS

As I look back on the past year, I'm wondering about the role of the Deacons in the church. Where do we fit in this fabric of the body?

- (1) As "Deacons," a word which means "Servant," we are servants of God set apart for serving his church. We seek to relieve the pastors of much of the regular work of the church that would keep them occupied. Each one of us is fully committed and involved in different areas of service in the church: Worship, Adult Sunday School, Youth, Children, Finances, and Building.
- (2) As Deacons, we are supposed to lead you into service for Christ. God has gifted his church with pastors, teachers, etc., to prepare his people for works of service. We are to lead by example, by instruction, and by encouragement. Pastor Lou has taken the lead in offering a class on "Prospective Leadership," and we are seeing more and more people involved in service.
- (3) At Wyoming, the Deacons also serve many of the roles of New Testament elders. We are responsible for providing direction and vision for the church, for dealing with division and disagreement among the body, and with formative and corrective discipline. These are tasks that are very difficult for us, and for which, quite honestly, we are not well prepared. Continue to encourage us as we seek to be peacemakers, not just appeasers, and as we work with Pastor Lou to articulate a strong vision for the future of this church God's church in this place.

This year I had the privilege of running this ministry. We started a little late in asking for donations, but we were tremendously blessed. Church of the Savior, First Baptist of Blackwood N.J., American Missionary Fellowship, Wyoming Ave Baptist Church and Whosoever Will Gospel were the ministries who help us accomplish this year's Toy Sale.

We give thanks to all of you who gave time, toys, money, tape, bake goods, wrapping paper and especially for Kristie, Jenny, Bobbi, Sue, Emily, Issam, Oji, and some of the teens who help wrap.

The way we got the families that we served was that we gave 10 applications to Bethel Temple, St. Christopher, In The Light Ministry, Aspira, Wyoming Ave Baptist and called last years contacts. This young pregnant wife, who has two girls at home, was refer to us because the money she saved for Christmas gifts for her girls and the rent money was stolen so someone gave her ten dollars because she was told that we charge a little amount to help get more supplies. Kristie helped her pick out a couple of stuff for her girls and even for the unborn baby, the whole time we were wrapping she had this worry look because we gave her so much. When we finished she asked me what did she owe, I told her nothing that we just wanted to bless her and she burst out crying, she couldn't stop thanking us enough.

I thank God for allowing me to be His channel to serve Him in whatever He calls me too.

Financial Reports and Budgets

WHAT IS A BUDGET?

What is a church budget? A church budget is a declaration of mission. It contains a number of vital ingredients.

- 1. A budget is the result of thought, prayer and planning. Jesus, in principle, made it very clear that before any work is undertaken the cost must first be counted (Luke 14: 28-33).
- 2. A budget is an attempt to do things decently and in order (1 Cor. 14:40). If we do not know where we are going, we might wind up someplace else.
- 3. A budget is a declaration of belief and commitment to God's work. It affirms financial support of God's work (Matt.6:33).
- 4. A budget is an act of faith. It declares trust in God relative to the future (Heb. 11:6), as well as belief in His work (Mark 26:15, 16).
- 5. A budget is a tool that helps each member plan his total stewardship. Giving to the church must be first (1 Cor. 4:1-3).
- 6. A budget is a challenge. It should stretch each member. It must be realistic, but at the same time contain enough challenge to cause each member to increase his giving.
- 7. A budget is an agreement. It must not be viewed as, "Their budget," or "The church's budget." It must be viewed as "Our budget."
- 8. A budget is a plan that brings each family together for prayer, Bible study, meditating, and planning, which leads to a "Here is what we will give, God being our helper!"

Basic Budget Numbers

General Fund

\$ 1,700 per week

The general fund is for the normal ongoing expenses of the church and its ministries. Pastor Lou's salary, church utilities, insurance, and office expenses all come from the general fund.

Building Fund

\$ 275 per week

The building fund is used to provide for the maintenance and upkeep of the church buildings. In addition to regular work, this fund covers major projects necessary to keep the building safe and comfortable.

Missions Fund

\$ 275 per week

Even though things are very tight within the church, we are committed to supporting missionaries and other organizations that reach out with the gospel to our city and our world. Just as each family sets aside a tithe for the church, so also we as a church set aside a tithe to support missions here and abroad.

"Faith Priorities"

As we look forward in faith, these are a few things that we see as important for the health of the church. With your faithful stewardship we are getting closer to these goals –

- 1. **Support a full-time pastor with benefits.** Currently we pay less than half of what Pastor Lou requires, and he must raise support from outside the church.
- 2. **Commit at least a "full tithe" to missions.** Even in our relative poverty, we need to be generous and faithful in supporting God's people outside our fellowship. We may reach this goal this year but we'll need to continue to commit to this priority.
- 3. **Financially commit to community outreach events.** The Family Fall Festival, Thanksgiving Dinner, and National Police Week events are supported primarily from outside our fellowship. We need to be committed and "fully invested" in these events.
